Abstract: In addition to musician and writer, Azkue was also a grammarian, lexicographer, folkore researcher, novelist and playswright. In this latter capacity, he published the following works: Vizcaytik Bizkaira (1895), Eguzkia nora (1896) Colonia Inglesa (1896), Sasi-eskola (1898), Pasa de Chimbos (1898), Ortzuri (1910), Urlo (1912) and Aitaren Bildur (1917). The use of popular songs was characteristic of Azkue, as well as the appearance of stereotypes customarily used inthet period. In 1895 Sabino Arana was to consider Vizcaytik Bizkaira a model of Basque national theatre.

Abstract: Resurrección María de Azkue promoted and cultivated narrative prose by means of his weekly journal Euskalzale (1897-1899). Far from limiting himself to being the mere driving force behind the journal, he also wrote pieces of narrative prose. Some of these pieces are published in various publications: one of them was published by the monthly journal La Abeja (1889-1890), the rest were published in Euskalzale. Lenengo irakurgaia, Bein da betiko (1893) and Ardi galdua (1918) were published in book form, while Latsibi remained unpublished.

Abstract: Azkue was the axis of the process of unification of the Basque language as from the beginning of his work up until his death: first in the unification of the Biskaian dialect and, later, as a result of the foundation of Euskaltzaindia in 1919, in the unification of the Basque language. I will deal with the beginning to this trajectory, with Euskal Izkindea, grammar treatise published in 1891, and with the success thereinafter attained by the proposals published there. In the models of written Biskaian developed as from the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century to the mid 20<sup>th</sup> century, Azkue's influence appears everywhere, both among the purists and among popular writers.

Azkue's first lyric works are the operettas, written in a spirit of nationalist propaganda. The example of C. Bordes, and the teachings of the Schola Cantorum later guided him towards the withdrawal and use, in his compositions, of songs and folk dances. In 1911 Azkue participates in the Basque opera season of the Choral Society of Bilbao with *Ortzuri*, the scenic presentation and lyrics of which are very appreciated. On the other hand, the libretto and the music of the lyric comedy *Urlo* suffers a complete lack of success.

In the ideological field he developed an autochthonous musical language, which is also termed as national. He also opposed the populism and the italianism present in Spanish music. Furthermore, he blazed trails and encouraged younger composers, like Jesus Guridi, to compose their pieces using Basque popular melodies, which he himself had recovered.
