My dear Don Manuel,

Please forgive my not answering sooner your kind and interesting letter of June 5th. The only reason for this delay was my hope that, by now, I should have been to see you in Paris. But unfortunately pressure of work here has made me postpone my journey. I was particularly sorry about this, as I was specially anxious to have a talk with my great friend Juan Axpe whom I had not seen for so very long.

Your letter suggests, with typically basque tact, that this would be a good moment for me to become a little more active with regard to the situation in Spain. I entirely agree with your suggestion. Indeed, it has been on my mind for some time that I have become a rather ineffective ally during recent months. This was, of course, partly due to the many personal matters awaiting my attention after the election.

My immediate plans do not envisage a return to active British politics before about a year. That is to say, if elections here take place before the end of 1951, I shall not participate. But I do, of course, intend to reenter politics in due course. But, for various personal reasons, a breathing space became necessary.

This is one more reason why I should now be happy to devote some efforts to the cause of Spanish and Basque democracy, about which (I am sure I don't need to tell you this) I feel as determined as ever. I should therefore very much like to have a detailed discussion with you as soon as it is possible for us to meet - either in Paris (where I hope to come fairly soon) or in London (if you should happen to come here first). We can then decide on some practical things I might do.

My wife asks me to send you her warmest personal greetings, to which, with your permission, I should like to add my own to you and to your brother.

I look forward to seeing you again very soon.
